<u>Background</u>

The Masai Mara Kenya, City of Peace is named after the Maasai people, who have lived in this region for centuries, and the word "Mara," which means "spotted" in the Maasai language. This refers to the landscape, dotted with acacia trees, shrubs, and the occasional lone bush. The Maasai have a deep cultural and spiritual connection to the land, which has shaped the region's history.

It's also a region where traditionally dressed Maasai still herd their cattle and goats in a lifestyle that in some respects hasn't changed much since they first arrived here 350 years ago.

The Maasai are a proud, semi-nomadic community with a rich cultural heritage. Their deep connection to the land and its wildlife makes them not just residents but also guardians of the Mara. The Maasai have long existed with wildlife, and their traditional practice are rooted in sustainable living.

The Project

The Project aims to cultivate the culture of peace, highlight the responsibility to provide the opportunity for prosperity, peace and partnership through the 2030 agenda for Sustainable Development; to talk about peace to bolster consensus building and social cohesion, and foster peacebuilding campaigns that counter dis-information and mis-information; and, to discuss and promote peace and tolerance in Masai Mara Kenya, and how it can be emulated in other areas.

Promote mutual understanding, goodwill, and peace within communities.

Focus

How travel, cultural exchange, and sustainable tourism practices can aid in resolving conflicts.

- 9. **Media and Peacebuilding**: How can the media be utilized to promote peace?
- 10.**Role of Local Leadership**: How can local leaders be more effectively involved in peacebuilding efforts?

<u>Budget</u>

To make this happen, we need to raise \$66,000.

It is pretty big number, but it is going to make enamours difference on the safety, prosperity, and quality of life for Masai Mara citizens and travellers.

Here's where the money is going:

DESIGNING: \$3,000 - architectural designing of the garden, buildings and grounds.

BUILDING: \$34,000 - constructing the garden headquarters.

TRANSPORTATION: \$6,000 - movement project supplies and building materials.

MARKETING: \$3,000 - marketing and fundraising for the project.

REWARDING: \$3,000 - rewards: sending letters, inscribing Masai Mara ICP and more.

TRAVELING: \$5,000 - the ICP volunteer team's travel to and from Kenya.

COORDINATING: \$2,500 - local agent coordinating the project.

LEGAL: \$1,000 - legal planning, counselling and certification.

OTHER DIRECT COSTS: \$6,000 - supplies for the nursery: fencing to keep out goats, chickens and wildlife, wheelbarrows, shovels, seedling pots, and a water catchment tank for our site where we can plant a better food forest and vegetable garden; metal poles, barbed wire, chain link, overall work done.

REPORTING: \$2,500 - reporting on project activities: phones, internet, record keeping, office stationery and supplies, and office security.
